Be on the lookout for programs and workshops that will teach, stretch, and help you grow, adapting you to the ever changing job market or that will help you learn a new life skill. The Digital Innovation Lab is located at the Canton branch dedicating materials and a physical space in the pursuit of science and technology exploration, and other creative discovery by individuals and groups within the community. We brought you the 3D printer but now the digital lab

will offer computer enhancement opportunities. There is a need for community members to be able to affordably create functioning prototypes, students to create visual aids to aid in educational displays, and additional outlets for Madison County residents to express and develop their creativity in a safe, non-judgmental environment. The lab is also helping us partner with the local tourism office as part of their annual Young Filmmakers Workshop. The digital lab is equipped with Learning Express Job and Career Accelerator. There will be educational programs and workshop designed for all ages around the digital learning environment. Upcoming Adult Programs

April is also Poetry Month and we will be celebrating "Poem in Your Pocket Day" on April 26. On this day, staff members will keep a short poem on them which they will read to patrons upon request. We will also have as part of our Poetry Month display, pre-made pockets with short poems in them for our patrons to take home as another addition to the April 26 celebration.

On May 23 at 2 p.m., we will have a Veteran's Benefits Informational Outreach Program. This program is structured around the available benefits for veterans and their families. Also, in May, we will welcome Shelia Spann from Merit Health in Madison. She will teach a three-part class series on diabetes. This class will be open for those with diabetes, those diagnosed with pre-diabetes, and those who want to learn how to prevent the disease.


This summer, we will have our Adult Summer Reading Program for the second year in a row. There will be programs adapted around adults as well as a chances to win prizes for their reading efforts. We hope to have just as much fun, if not more, than we did last summer!

Adult Programs

We have evolved most of our programming to fit the needs of the working environment of Ridgeland. Patrons love that we stay open a little later for them to enjoy programming in the library after work providing them with the materials they request for a great time! We decided to transform Gaming 101, to "Get Graphic", a graphic novel book club to see if we can have a steady growth in attendance.

Community Partnerships

We recognized that customers of Comic Commander are avid comic book readers and not hardcore gamers, so we shifted our focus for this outreach opportunity. We will be kicking it off in June. We also have continued our outreach to the two nursing homes in the Ridgeland area and have a few new volunteers who have been helping us.

The Children's area is growing with innovating programming, like adult programming, which finds the niche that works for the children and teens of the area. Ms. Keke has been doing great striving to bring the "community to the library" and the "library to the community" with her outreach programs to local daycares.

Coming up this next year are some special programs such as the Music and Mind Series during our Adult Summer Reading program. We will have speakers come and talk about ways music impacts movies, games, and more. We will show case live music with three local musicians/bands on Thursdays. This will help promote community involvement and truly display the meaning of this year's Summer Reading, "Libraries Rock".

The Dinner Murder Mystery Parties have been a hit. We will be launching our third one in July after summer reading. We have had requests from our patrons to keep this program in our rotating schedule and will find ways to implement them at least two to three times a year.

Escape The Library 4 will happen in August. It has been wildly popular and we want to keep the interest growing. The combination of working with the Breakout EDU items and using the library as a unique spin has worked wonders.





Anti-bullying programs are NOT boring!

On Thursday, January 25, the Canton branch collaborated with Tashmia Powell-Turner, Family & Consumer Sciences Extension Agent (Madison County Extension Service), and acted as cyber-arms in protecting both adults and children from Cyber-bullies. At this workshop, Ms. Turner emphasized how new technologies such as; instant messaging, text messaging, e-mail,

social networking sites, and video capable cell phones have taken on a new life and a new name: cyberbullying. Attendees learned that there are several methods and rules that can help them and their child/children deal with the cyberbullies in their neighborhood.

Each branch of the Madison County Library System strives to connect its community in a way that benefits everyone. And as such, per our patrons and library users suggestions, we now host a yoga class. This is a free one-hour yoga class on the first Friday of every month taught by Ms. Jean Powers. Ms. Powers is a Speech Instructor at Holmes Community College and has worked part-time for UMMC's University

Wellness Center in Flowood (aka Courthouse Racquetball & Fitness Club) as a Yoga/Abs/

Pilates Instructor since 2001. You may have seen her in a couple of television commercials a few years ago for UMMC. She was one of the first yoga teachers in MS to become registered through Yoga Alliance (info.yogaalliance.com), a national organization which lists names of instructors in the country licensed to teach yoga. Instructors must be approved and have 80+ training session hours, 14 hours of observation

& assisting, and 12 hours student teaching to receive RYT designation to begin teaching. But that is just the beginning she says. She went on to receive training in all levels of Yogafit, CCYT (Christ Centered Yoga Training), and Yin Yoga certifications. She started her yoga journey in 1982 searching for a way to relieve chronic back pain. "I found when I did yoga, I didn't hurt as much—so I did more and more of it to relieve my pain. It also helps me to sleep better and deal with daily stress. I especially enjoy working with those who have injuries and showing them safe modifications. Most of yoga is physical therapy designed to help heal the body."

Our monthly Diabetes Self-Management Workshop with Merit Health is a community-based workshop which allows participants to maintain a quality of life when living with type 2 diabetes. The workshops are facilitated by Shelia Spann, Pharm. D. CDE (Pharmacist and Diabetes Educator), and trained professionals, who live with or help people manage diabetes.



The Canton branch has partnered with Canton-Madison (MS) Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. Ken Jones is a member of the Canton-Madison (MS) Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. where he serves as Guide Right Director. Their Guide Right program includes mentors such as the former Canton Mayor Arnel Bolden, former State Senator Kenny Wayne Jones, Warren Reed, Sr., and many others. This program is geared towards students in grades 9-11 and is designed to help students for educational, occupational, and social guidance of male students.

They focus on 5 pillars that include- Self Identity, Training, Competition, Social and Health Education. Currently, we have 45 students in the Central Mississippi chapter and it usually opens up for new attendees in April or May of each year.

Timmy Pickett, Crisis Specialist Region8 Mental Health, will host a specialized mental health training program at the Canton branch on Tuesday, May 15, 2018, from 5:30 pm –6:30 pm. This workshop will raise awareness, break down stigmas, increase individuals' alertness on how to look for signs associated with suicide or harm to self or others, encourage people to seek appropriate professional help, inspire self-help, reassure the importance of listening nonjudgmentally and other support approaches.

Patrons eagerly joined a demonstration of our 3D-Printer conducted by Director, Tonja Johnson. Many patrons and library users have expressed how excited they are and can hardly wait to try their hands at the new technology. The demonstration

was well received. According to an observer, "I am fascinated by the way 3D printing allows me to create educational materials, real world products, and other COOL STUFF!"

MY Library Story LIBRARIES LEAD



I began volunteering at the Madison branch soon after moving to Mississippi four years ago. Before that, I'd worked in two public library systems in the Washington, DC metro area. They were both large and wealthy, and each served many thousands of patrons. I expected things to be very different here but found that the Madison library offered the services of big city systems with a small-town warmth and community focus.

VCLS

There are books, of course - on the shelf, on CD or cassette tape, and on the Library's website for digital download. There are magazines, computers, printers, copiers and fax machines. There are reading and craft groups, seasonal programs, film screenings, programs for adults, for children, and for special needs groups. In short, I found everything I thought a good public library should offer. Yet as good as these services are, they probably wouldn't account for the smiles I see on the faces of patrons as they come through the door and are greeted by the

staff. Sometimes it seems to me everybody in Madison has a friend at this library. That's because our Madison Library thinks big but acts like a neighbor. Everything it does - the materials it buys (books in all their formats, DVDs, databases, computers, etc.) and the programs it offers - is done with a knowledge of the Madison community acquired over many years of listening and serving. The public libraries we have today are one of the greatest legacies of American democracy. In my view they are one of the last, few places that bring our communities together. This is the spirit I see at work at the Madison Library.

But as Joni Mitchell famously warned: "You don't know what you've got 'til it's gone." There is no law that requires communities to have a library. Many in Mississippi do not. We in Madison County are fortunate to have mayors, county supervisors and - so far - state legislators who understand and support the work of our public libraries. When the financial crisis of 2008 hit, officials across the country decided they had many priorities more important to them than libraries, and so branches were closed, hours reduced and staff and programs eliminated. As a librarian at that time, I saw this firsthand. I discovered then that even in good times, public libraries tend to get the smallest slice of the budgetary pie.

We are so accustomed to having libraries that we assume they'll always be there for us or our children and their children. But we have to remind ourselves that we library users are the "public" in "public library" and have a role in insuring its well-being. Fortunately, nothing could be easier. The way I see it every library patron is also a library advocate. Everyone who checks out or downloads a book, uses a computer or attends a program is making a statement of support that says "I care about this!"



The Technology team at Madison County Library System has been diligently working to bring our patrons and staff the best user experience with software and equipment. This year we installed new network switches at our branches to utilize additional bandwidth. In addition, we replaced all legacy hard drives with solid state drives and upgraded the memory on all public computers. These upgrades will help the patrons to browse and use the computer faster and more efficiently. The library system invested in some cool new services for adults and youth alike. Britannica Online brings a variety of different research medias together in one place such as encyclopedias, websites, eBooks, magazines and more for the ultimate learning experience. The Learning Express Job and Career Accelerator is perfect for adults looking for colleges, needing help with resume design and format, finding a career match, and exploring occupations. The new Digital Innovation Lab at the Canton Branch will enhance and expand patron's technology experience. The lab consists of Macs, Adobe Creative Cloud software for graphic design, video editing software, and more. We also updated our AV equipment for Ridgeland, Canton, Flora, and Camden with Blu-Ray players, speakers, and short-throw LCD projector to improve family and youth viewing programs. To meet the needs of our patrons, we plan to add additional equipment to the Digital Innovation Lab, replace public computers with Windows 10 machines, purchase Chromebooks for Youth Services programming, and upgrade bandwidth at all branches.

- Prints are .10 per gram. For example, a custom keychain might be \$1 or a pencil cup might be \$2. The 3D printer software will provide an estimate of time and weight before you start.
- Great for school projects, entrepreneurs, artists, hobbies and so much more.
